# Book Review by Elizabeth D: Apeirogon by Colum McCann

In geometry, an apeirogon (from the Greek word  $\alpha$ neipo $\alpha$ 0 apeiros, "infinite, boundless" and  $\alpha$ 1 gonia, "angle") or infinite polygon is a generalized polygon with a countably infinite number of sides. I have read this definition several times and still

can't fathom it. However, the book is wonderful. I am actually listening to it being read online via the BBC in ten, 15-minute episodes: (https://www.bbc.co.uk/programmes/m000fpmz).

The novel is 'inspired by actual events' and the two protagonists are a Palestinian, Bassam Aramin, and an Israeli, Rami Elhanan – friends in real life following the deaths of their daughters and their subsequent search for peace and understanding which led them both to join Combatants for Peace.

It is so strange to follow their journey – getting to know each other – studying the history of the 'other' - the Holocaust, the Occupation as they move closer to each other and work only for peace because "Their message to their communities is that the moment has come because the price of one more child is a price too far." The novel is told in 1001 chapters – some merely a photograph – and is a reference to 1001 Nights – telling a story to delay death. Nelson Public Library has just purchased two copies.
